### **BLACK HISTORY MONTH (AND EVERY MONTH) AT HOME**

In a <u>2017 opinion piece</u> in *The New York Times*, American philosopher and professor George Yancy wrote, "White people ought to use [Black History] month to engage in a shared form of vulnerability and mourning, a collective recognition, with a fearless countenance, of how white racist complicity and black suffering were historically linked and are currently intertwined. Such a courageous act of vulnerability is not about white guilt, but white responsibility."


Although it's been six years since Yancy penned that article, it's clear that a "white responsibility" remains. If your family identifies as white, we encourage you to use Black History Month as an opportunity to build awareness and deepen the understanding of this responsibility at home. At Kimberley Beaches Alternative we are on a journey to help build an inclusive future for our community. Celebrating Black history, Canadians and communities isn't about one month of the year. It is a lifelong commitment where we are learning, celebrating and breaking down barriers to empower future generations. 

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# REMEMBERING BLACK HISTORIES & CELEBRATING BLACK FUTURES



### **RESOURCES FOR PARENTS & CAREGIVERS**

<u>The visionary thinking behind Black History Month</u> – This Black History Month, start at the beginning. In this article for the Boston Globe, Associate Professor Jarvis R. Givens pays tribute to Black history with a book written almost a century ago by Black History Month founder and academic, Carter G. Woodson.



<u>Black Soul (9 mins)</u> – Martine Chartrand's animated short from the National Film Board of Canada dives into the heart of Black culture with an exhilarating trip though history. Watch as a young boy traces his roots through the stories his grandmother shares with him about the events that shaped their cultural heritage.

<u>If your child asks, "Why isn't there a white history month?"</u> – Instagram influencer and educator Britt Hawthorne (<u>@BrittHawthorne</u>) provides accessible language and tactics on how to (re)educate your children and yourself about racial identities, white supremacy and why BHM isn't only about historical perspectives. Hawthorne provides support for free but welcomes donations of a few dollars for her labour.

<u>Meleko Mokgosi: Imaging Imaginations</u> – The Art Gallery of York University presents artist Meleko Mokgosi's first solo exhibition in Canada. On view until June 10, this exhibition debuts a new body of paintings and prints by Mokgosi, who is well known for his imposing and vivid multi-panel paintings that feature hyperrealistic depictions of Black figures within narrative scenes.



<u>White Privilege: Unpacking the Invisible Knapsack</u> – This 1989 article by Peggy McIntosh is a seminal piece on recognizing white privilege. If you identify as white and it's been a while since you've read it (or if you haven't read it before), it's an important message to revisit.

<u>Toronto Black Film festival</u> – Running February 15–20, the Toronto Black Film Festival is a platform for Black artists to share their creative voices. Watch more than 125 films from 20 countries.

#### EXPLORE THE BEAUTIFUL KALEIDOSCOPE OF AFROFUTURISM



For the uninitiated, Afrofuturism is a fluid ideology shaped by generations of artists, musicians, scholars, and activists whose aim is to reconstruct "Blackness" in the culture. You've seen Afrofuturism represented in music and fashion (George Clinton and Janelle Monáe), in film (*Black Panther* and *A Wrinkle in Time*) and in literature (science-fiction writer Octavia E. Butler). Explore and celebrate further the beautiful kaleidoscope that is Afrofuturism through the below resources.

<u>Afrofuturism Has Always Looked Forward</u> – This Architectural Digest article explores Afrofuturism and provides "notes on the future" by asking, How can the ideology serve as a blueprint for cultural growth?

<u>Meet artist Quentin VerCetty</u> – Montreal artist Quentin VerCetty is a multiple award-winning multidisciplinary storyteller, educator, and Afrofuturist. In this Carnegie Hall interview they talk about their work as one of the world's leading Afrofuturist artists.

<u>Black is King</u> – This film/visual album by Beyonce reimagines the lessons from *The Lion King: The Gift* for today's youth in search of their own crowns. It is an Afrobeat-infused collection of musical vignettes that features many Afrofuturistic images.

<u>Experience the music of AfrotroniX</u> – AfrotroniX merges electronic music with African rhythms and electric Touareg blues. Created by the Chadian guitarist Caleb Rimtobaye, AfrotroniX live shows mix an electro DJ, live instruments, African urban dance performances and digital art. Listen to the music and watch the mesmerizing videos.

<u>Afrofuturism inspires</u> – Carnegie Hall presented it's citywide Afrofuturism festival last year but you can still explore a myriad of carefully curated online resources on the ever-expansive aesthetic of Afrofuturism.
